Black Ice tournament kicks off at White Park

katers from Concord and beyond took to the ice at White Park yesterday to kick off the first 1883 Black Ice Pond Hockey Championship, a three-day tournament that organizers hope will be an annual celebration of hock-ey's past and future in the

city.
"It's just really an opportunity to get out there, have some fun and celebrate hock-ey," said Gov. John Lynch, who dropped the ceremonial first puck and is playing in the tournament on a team named the Lynch Gang.

Some 50 teams and 350 players are participating, with games played yesterday and today and playoffs scheduled for tomorrow at six rinks set

up on the pond. The National Weather Service has forecast highs in the 20s this weekend, with a 50-50 chance of snow showers today.

"You couldn't ask for any-thing better," said spectator Lynn Acres of yesterday's

cold, clear weather.
Led by bagpiper Derek
Davidson, the first shift of
players leapt onto the frozen pond yesterday morning dur ing an opening ceremony that included the playing of the national anthem and Lynch's puck drop.

Also recognized were members of the famed Sacred Heart team, which played the U.S. Olympic team in 1952 before the Olympians traveled to Oslo, Norway. (The Concord team lost 8-6 but was leading 5-3 going into the third period, according to fournament materials.)

That's just one of many nods the tournament has made to Concord's hockey heritage. Its name refers to the 1883 match at St. Paul's School believed to be the first hockey game played in the United States, and winning teams will win a stick named after hockey great and St. Paul's alum Hobey

With fighting, checking and goaltending banned by tournament rules, the play yesterday focused more on precision than power. And some of the scores were lopsided: The New London and Wilmot fire-fighters beat the Boys & Girls Club team, 18 to 3.

But fans loved it.

"It's just fun to watch, and there's some good hockey players," said Acres, 64, a Concord resident who said he came to watch friends and his daughter, who is playing on the Babes of Glory.

There weren't more than a few dozen spectators at the park for some of yesterday's early games, but Recreation Director David Gill said he expects today will be the tournament's big day, estimating several thousand people will turn out.

Chris Brown, tournament organizer and the president and chief operating officer of New Hampshire Distribu-

tors, agreed.
Today's festivities, he said,
will bring in "local people just
hanging out and watching
games."

Merchandise for the tour nament is being sold on site, along with \$1 coffee or hot chocolate and \$3 sausages or chili at a concession tent run by Cimo's South End Deli. Team registration fees

and corporate sponsorships have brought in money not only to hold and sustain the tournament, but also to improve outdoor skating areas in Concord, Brown has

Just about everything at the tournament, from the rinks to the shovels players use to clear the ice after games, is sponsored by local law firms, businesses and others. (The Concord Insider, published by the Monitor, is the media sponsor) Just about everything at sor.)

The games will wrap up at the park about noon tomor-row. The pond will reopen for public skating Monday morn-ing. White Street will remain closed between Blanchard and Washington streets until


