A.J. Gale's goal at 8:54 of the third period forced overtime, where Worcester outshot the Monarchs, 4-0, but neither team



BOSTON - After the highlights were shown on the scoreboard and the two former Celtics acknowledged the latest in a series of standing ovations,

the cameras panned up to the rafters, where the franchise has hung more banners than any other NBA team. First shown was the list of retired numbers, where two blank spots should eventually be filled: with Paul Pierce's No. 34 for certain and proba-

bly also the No. 5 that Kevin Garnett

wore for his six years in Boston. Then the scoreboard showed the 2008 NBA title banner the two won in their first

year together with the Celtics.

"That was our era. No one can ever take that away from us," Garnett said after the Nets beat the Celtics, 85-79, last night. "I think we will always bleed green as long as we play basketball. We'll bleed green when we're six feet under" feet under?
