The Toronto native, now teaching at Concord High, is heading up a move to organize a sextet to represent this city in a proposed New Hampshire amateur hockey league.

An organization meeting will be held at the Community Center Wednesday, Nov. 14, at 8 p.m. All local hockey players interested in playing organized hockey for the city club are urged to attend.

The handsome young CHS teacher captained the UNH Wildcat sextet last season, playing a stellar role as center on the Cats' first line. He is currently looking for sponsors for a senior men's league at White Park, as well as for the proposed city club.

McKinnon said today that both the men's league and the city team would have the 100 per cent backing of the city Recreation Department.

Acting Director Robert Ayer has conferred with McKinnon on plans for the coming hockey season, and has promised the department's cooperation with the league and club leaders.

Also interested, said McKinnon, is the Key Club, sponsored by Concord Kiwanians.

McKinnon says he believes there is enough good hockey material in the Concord area to give this city strong representation in inter-city and town competition.

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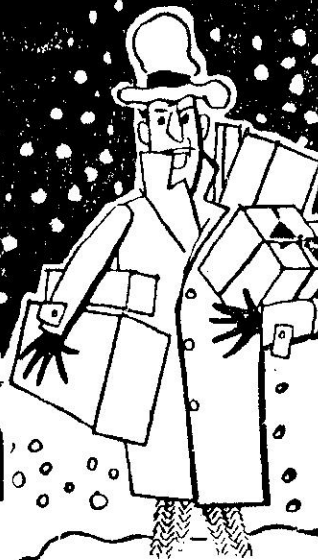

CHASING THE PUCK

In the mail this week came a brochure from the Amateur Hockey Association of U.S., announcing "Youth Hockey Week" Jan. 26 through Feb. 3.

Enclosed was a cardboard pocket handkerchief of the kind used as advertising gimmicks by some laundries and dry cleaning establishments.

On the handkerchief is printed the message: "We Ask your Support For Youth Hockey Week U.S.A. Jan. 26-Feb. 3."

More than 45,000 boys are playing organized hockey in the United States this year, as members of some 3,200 teams. Concord is helping in this movement by sponsorship of Pee Wee and Bantam Leagues, and a City team which has been entered in the new Granite State League.

In addition to organized leagues for American youth, there are now 420 high and prep school teams in the nation. Minnesota and Michigan are taking the lead in the formation of boys teams, but New England is also a hotbed of hockey on the interscholastic and amateur level.

Massachusetts has more than 100 high school teams and New Hampshire now has a dozen or so high and private school sextets playing long schedules.

Lack of enough artificial ice rinks is the one big drawback in the expansion of the sport in this neck of the woods.

Sunday's Schedule

On Sunday's schedule—the National Football League Playoff Bowl at Miami between runners up in the Eastern and Western Conferences, the Pittsburgh Steelers vs. the Detroit Lions; the 17th Hula Bowl at Honolulu, matching two college all-star teams, and the first Crusade Bowl at Baltimore, which pairs off two teams made up mostly of NFL draft choices.

Fifty collegians join the pay-for-play ranks in the Senior Bowl which will be nationally televised by NBC starting at 2 p.m. EST. Those on the winning side will receive \$800 each. The losers get \$500 apiece.

Players in the Challenge Bowl also turn pro, with \$800 going to each member of the winning team and \$600 to each loser.

The Steelers will be trying to even a score in their Playoff Bowl date with the Lions, who swamped Pittsburgh 45-7 in the regular season opener. This one will be televised by NBC at 2 p.m. EST.

A glittering parade of talent will be on display in Honolulu Sunday. There are five All-Americans on the North team—ends Pat Richter of Wisconsin and Dave Robinson of Penn State, tackles Bobby Bell of Minnesota and Don Brumm of Purdue and fullback George Saines of Michigan State—and two on the South squad—halfback Jerry Stovall of LSU and guard Johnny Treadwell of Texas.
